Nominations for the COC Certificate

Excerpts from the COC president concerning the COC Certificate:

Awarded in recognition of individuals or groups for outstanding service to the Canadian orchid world. To be awarded by the COC on the basis of well supported proposals by member society(s) or individuals.

Criteria: To be awarded to individuals or groups for one or more of the following:

1. Outstanding service to the Canadian Orchid community in organization, promotion or leadership.

2. Outstanding achievement in orchid research, hybridizing, culture or conservation. **Number per year:** No limit, based on merit.

Selection Process: Well supported proposals by member society(s), or individuals.

Publication: To be awarded, celebrated, and published in the COC newsletter with appropriate commentary.

1. Proposals will be accepted by the COC secretary up to four months before the AGM at which the certificate(s) are to be awarded (in extenuating circumstances the president may choose to waive the four months requirement).

The proposals should be no more than 1 page in length and should indicate:

- Name of the Candidate(s)
- Category being honoured

-Justification why the candidate deserves the honour (not to exceed 500 words):

- national service
- research excellence
- conservation contributions etc

- Name(s) of persons that support the nomination including their relationship to the candidate.

In order to be awarded at the 2009 COC meeting, submissions need to be in to the COC rep, Kevin Duerksen <u>before</u> Oct 5 (waiving the 4 month requirement). 10 EASY ORCHID MISTAKES

1. Trying to grow plants that are meant to be disposable.

Most of the plants sold at grocery stores and flower shops are meant to be disposed of, after they finish blooming. They have been grown fast and hard and forced to bloom early. They are exhausted and need several years of good growing conditions to be strong enough to bloom again. The strongest plants come from plants purchased at orchid shows and from orchid growers.

2. **Over watering.** Most common orchids are epiphytic plants. They grow attached to trees or rocks. These orchids have roots that have evolved to soak up water during a rain and dry out between rains. If kept constantly wet and buried in a pot these roots suffocate and die.

More orchids are killed by overwatering than in any other way. Really dry your plants out between each watering.

The weight of the pot is a good indicator of how much water it still contains. Also remember that orchids need fairly high humidity. Adding more water at the roots will not compensate for low humidity and will usually cause the roots to rot.

3. **Not enough light.** Orchids need as much light as possible without burning the leaves to flower well or at all. Dark green leaves look pretty but they mean the plant is not getting enough light. Your goal should be light green leaves, not yellow-green or deep green.

4. **Too much light.** Too much light, especially too much direct sunlight, can burn the orchid's leaves and make them useless for photosynthesis. Again the goal is light green leaves. A little bit of purple pigmentation is showing the orchid is getting the absolute maximum amount of light it can stand and is a sign you should back off a little bit. Like people, orchids can adapt to extra sunlight. But like people, they cannot do it overnight. Increase light slowly over a couple of weeks.

5. Keeping your orchids at a constant temperature day and night.

Orchids use the energy they have trapped in the process of photosynthesis both day and night. You can reduce the amount of energy the plant uses at night by lowering the temperature by 5 to 10 degrees Celsius from the daytime temperature. It can then use the saved energy for growth and flowering.

6. Not remembering that seasons change.

When the days get shorter orchids do not need as much water. When autumn begins you should water less. When the days get longer and the sun gets stronger orchids can get too much light and burn. And your orchids will need more water. February is an especially dangerous month in Vancouver for the sun suddenly damaging your orchids.

7. Not repotting frequently enough.

Fir bark and sphagnum moss break down over a year or two and get water sodden. This can kill orchid roots. So do not neglect repotting an orchid even if it looks like there is still plenty of room in the pot. It is not space you are concerned about; it is the condition of the growing media.

8. Crushing the roots when repotting.

Orchid roots are brittle and crush easily. Once crushed the roots die. So do not press down hard on the potting media when repotting.

Gently tease the media down between the roots with a dull knife or a chopstick. If you soak the orchid for an hour before repotting the roots are a bit stronger. Also, after repotting, do not water for at least a week so the roots have time to heal without being stressed. If you soaked the plant before repotting this will not be a problem.

9. Using regular garden fertilizer. Most garden fertilizer has urea as a nitrogen source. Plants cannot absorb nitrogen in the form of urea. They rely on soil bacteria to change the urea to nitrates and ammonium compounds the orchids can absorb. Orchids are not in soil so the necessary bacteria are not there. Use a fertilizer designed for orchids or one designed for hydroponics.

10. **Over fertilizing.** Orchids are intolerant of excess salts in the potting media. Always make sure that you flush out the media with clean water at least once or twice between fertilizer applications. Never apply fertilizer at the same strength you would use for house or garden plants. One teaspoon per gallon (0.5mL/L) is the maximum strength for orchids. A half-teaspoon per gallon (0.25 mL/L) is actually enough. Excess salts will cause the leaf tips to turn black and burn and can destroy the roots in the pots.
